The Sarcoma Cup (www.sarcomacup.org) is a charity fundraiser and celebration of the sailing life that features great racing, excellent dockside activities, and support for a very worthy cause. All proceeds beyond costs will go towards research for a cure for Sarcoma, the 'forgotten cancer' - and we will strive to cover all costs through some form of sponsorship. The Sarcoma Cup trophy itself was custom-made for the event and donated by Jerry Kermode, a world-class woodworking master.

1.0 Rules:

The regatta will be governed by the Racing Rules of Sailing (2009-2012).

2.0 Advertising

Advertising will be restricted to Category A.

3.0 Eligibility

All one design classes and PHRF racers are invited to this event. Multihulls and short-handed sailors are welcome on Sunday. Youth 29er fleet invited (must be 19 or younger to enter)

4.0: Entry Fee:

- Saturday: \$ 1.25/ft

- Sunday: \$ 1.25/ft
- \$10 late fee after August 25

5.0 Venue and Schedule:

5.1 Saturday:

a) Saturday's races will be conducted in the vicinity of the Southampton Shoal/Berkeley Circle. There will be a start for each one-design class or PHRF fleet with 5 or more boats, and a cruising division. Three races are planned, however, the race committee may decide to run fewer races depending on conditions.

b) The race committee may establish two separate racing areas to minimize the interactions of fleets.

c) Warning is at 1100.

5.2 Sunday:

a) Most fleets will sail a reverse handicap long distance race 'Islands of Hope', around islands within the bay, starting in the Southampton area and finishing near the Berkeley Marina breakwater.

b) The J105 fleet and the Open 5.70 fleet will be given 2 buoy races on Sunday, in the Southampton/Berkeley Circle area, by prior arrangement. Other fleets desiring a buoy race on Sunday are requested to please contact the Regatta Chair, no later than 8/15. Availability of this option is limited and at the discretion of the race organizers. Please contact the race chair, Mark Lowry at lowry3@lInl.gov.

c) Warning for all fleets is at 1100.

6.0 Sailing Instructions:

Sailing instructions will be available no later than August 20 at www.sarcomacup.org or at Berkeley Yacht Club. Copies of the sailing instructions will be available on the day of the races.

7.0 Scoring

All buoy race results will be used to calculate and score each fleet (no throw-outs).

8.0 Awards:

8.1 Fleet awards will be awarded on Saturday - Awards will be given to 1st and 2nd place for divisions with 5 boats and to 1st, 2nd and 3rd place for fleets with more than 5 boats.

8.2 Sarcoma Cup perpetual trophy and pursuit race trophies will be awarded on Sunday. There will be a take home trophy for the winner of the Sarcoma Cup. There will also be awards given out to 1st, 2nd, 3rd. There will also be awards given to the 14th finisher.

Docking:

1200 Friday visiting yachts are welcomed to dock in the Berkeley Marina. A map of available docking space will be published early August at www.sarcomacup.org - these spaces have been generously made available to Sarcoma Cup racers by the Berkeley Marina. Berths will be allocated at no cost on a first come first served basis and while we do not expect to run out of space, we recommend that you contact sarcomacup@beatsarcoma.org to reserve a space as early as possible. The Berkeley Marina will make one of the launch ramps exclusively available to small boats racing in the Sarcoma Cup. Water taxis will operate in the marina and ferry passengers during the dockside event hours and can be ordered via **VHF channel 68** or by calling **415-200-7309**. Vessels are welcome to stay overnight at the BYC guest dock on Sunday.

The south entrance to the Berkeley Marina, passing to the south of the detached riprap breakwater, is the preferred entrance. Controlling depth at the zero tide level is approx. 7 ft. Use the north edge of Skates restaurant (the building overhanging the water to the north of the fishing pier) as a range. Turn towards the breakwater when the south end bears approx. 30 degrees magnetic.

Parking:

Public parking is available throughout the Berkeley Marina on a first come first served basis. Most boats will be able to raft up close to the venue for the evening entertainment and the Berkeley Marina will offer water taxi services for the others.

- Each school day, 46 children are diagnosed with cancer in the US and 10 with some form of sarcoma

- 10 people/day will die of soft tissue sarcoma (Source: WrongDiagnosis)

- About 170,000 each year will be diagnosed with sarcoma around the world (Source: Wrong Diagnosis

and national agencies. Warning: some statistics are difficult to gather in some developing countries)

- 20% of all childhood cancers are sarcomas. Sarcoma mostly affects children, teenagers and young adults

- 'Sarcomas is the most common hard tumor in young adults today' – (Institute Gustave Roussy, Villejuif, France)

- Sarcomas are uncommon cancers because it primarily affects children and young adults. The highest percentage of cancer occurrences is among the elderly. However, sarcoma destroys many more lives

before they have time to blossom, thus contributes to many days that could have been lived if it

weren't for cancer.

- Studies released in 2008 by the Journal of the National Cancer Institute showed that children who

survive cancers have an increased risk of developing a secondary sarcoma, compared with the general population

- The secondary cancer type most often developed by cancer patients as a side effect of radiotherapy is sarcoma.
- Osteosarcoma is the most frequent bone cancer. 60% of these tumors occur in children aged between 10 to 20 years- old (Institut Gustave Roussy at Villejuif, 2008)

Sarcoma has no cure today

Supporting sarcoma research will have a huge impact

- Important funding needs: Sarcomas are hard to diagnose, hard to detect and hard to treat. Biopsy is the only diagnostic tool and surgery often the only curative treatment. Many sarcomas resist current cancer treatments.
- High return on funds: Sarcoma research is still at the beginning of the learning curve. The incremental value of every dollar is high. Donors and sponsors can make a noticeable impact
- Far- reaching benefits: BeatSarcoma favors fundamental translational and early clinical research as opposed to late clinical trials. The funding needs there are greater and the benefits far- reaching.
- No "tax" levied on donations: Currently, 100% of funds raised through sarcoma cup support sarcoma research.
- Complete Transparency: BeatSarcoma publishes all relevant financial and medical information.
- Powerful Focus: In order to reach efficiencies of scale and a greater impact, BeatSarcoma is focused on sarcoma- related issues.

BeatSarcoma is organized around the idea of racing and sailing.
